Lutitia, fifth child of Charity Starin Fluskey, and her husband, Almeron Porter Lincoln, were both born in the Mohawk Valley, the former in Schuyler, N. Y., and the latter, October 7, 1808, in the village of Little Lakes (Indian name, Wa-i-on-tha), Herkimer county, N. Y. She died January 14, 1863. He died April 12, 1855. He was known as Captain Lincoln, and was part owner of the Hudson River steamboats *Francis* and *Rip Van Winkle*. They were married in 1832.
