

"His nature was strongly and most genially social. And a seeming forwardness in society showed itself on closer and long-continued intimacy as but the vent of his intense honest delight in social communings. We have been with him in the vale where as true humility and self-abasement gave their quiet light, as are often seen in the ministry. He was charitable to attribute to mistaken judgment or inconsiderateness what was hardest for him to bear, and the church and people of God had his changeless love and ever prompt defense. From our companionships we miss a friend, and from all our works a zealous helper. Humanity mourns a lover and defender of its rights, and the country an ever-faithful patriot citizen."

In fine, in the words of the poet Lawson :

"There rests

A man of God, for heaven was his on earth,
A friend of man, for all the world he loved;
A hero, for he smil'd at death,
And died to live forever."

Regarding their children the following particulars are of interest :

Daniel Galusha, who was born September 6, 1841, at Bridgeport, Conn., was married to Louise Heilback at Knox, Ind., by Rev. Mr. Chapin of that place, July 17, 1883. His wife was born in Chicago, February 12, 1859, and received her education in Cologne, Germany. They have one child, viz.: Eva Louisa, born September 20, 1884, at Chicago, Ill.

Elmer C., who was born February 2, 1845, at Palmyra, N. Y., was married at Chicago, to Sarah M. Buchanan, by Rev. E. J. Goodspeed, D. D., of that city, November 1, 1871. His wife was born July 11, 1850, in Chicago, and was the daughter of Scottish parents—her father, John Burns Buchanan, being from Glasgow, and her mother, Elizabeth McGilvray, from Inverness. She died September 25, 1884, and is buried at Graceland, Chicago. They had three
