EBENEZER ALVORD (*Ebenezer, Alexander*), born Northampton, Mass., Dec. 17, 1720; died Hatfield, Mass., Aug. 7, 1784; married Northampton, Mass., Dec. 19, 1754, Catharine Strong, daughter of Nathaniel and Miriam (Sheldon) Strong. She was born Northampton, Mass., July 18, 1729; died Northampton, Mass., Sept. 11, 1773. Res. Northampton, Mass. Children:

"Ebenezer Alvord resided on Hawley St. in 1749. He was taxed 2 polls, 34 est."

Rev. War Service: He served nine months in the Revolutionary War." (Hist. of Northampton.)

Mrs. Catharine Alvord has a tombstone in the old Northampton cemetery.

"Ebenezer Alvord's house stood with end to the road, had diamond windows, in 1762 two rooms, another was added to E. end when Ebenezer was married, had weaver's shop on west end next to street. Mrs. Wright (b. '56) remembers old lady (Eliab's grandmother). She and Mary lived there. Ruth or Mary used to keep school for girls seventy years ago (or about 1765), or more.

"From Mrs. Graves 1832. As above, only one and a half story house. Ruth married when an old maid, but before Mrs. G. remembers. Mary, no energy. No school kept there. Old woman and Mary moved slow. Ebenezer Alvord poor,—did nothing but weave,—rather indolent, but could talk sensibly, was a very corpulent man, large belly, went to Hatfield, lived better there. Old maid at Hatfield could not be persuaded to make a written will,—said her word was enough. Doct. Lyman and Samuel Smith at length persuaded her to make a will. Gave most to Ebenezer. Ebenezer's daughter, Elizabeth, a good scholar, intelligent woman." (Judd Manuscript.)
