

Joseph Alvord was a lame man, having a club foot. About the year 1795 the family removed to New York State and settled first near Hamilton, Madison Co., N. Y., afterwards near Rochester, where they were residing during the War of 1812. (There may be a confusion in the above with his son Joseph.)

Caleb Chapin, father of Submit, was in the French and Indian War with his two sons, Joel and Hezekiah, and was killed by the Indians Sept. 8, 1755, in the battle of Bloody Pond, near Lake George. He said to his sons: "Boys, they are too hard for us, you must run. I am wounded and cannot." They never saw him alive again.

80. STEPHEN ALVORD (*Joseph, Ebenezer, Alexander*), born Northampton, Mass., Aug. 18, 1735; died Canada, Mar., 1812; married Abigail Davis, daughter of Simon and Mary (Powers) Davis. She was born prob. Chesterfield, Mass., about 1747; died Windsor, Vt., June 3, 1820. Res. Charlestown, N. H., Windsor, Vt., and Woodstock, Vt. Children:

Stephen Alvord was a hatter by occupation. Mrs. Gibbs (daughter) said that her father became an Episcopalian and that he was in the Revolutionary War. (No record found.) He was in the French and Indian war, 1759-1760. At Charlestown, N. H., "Lord's day" June 1, 1777, Stephen Alvord and wife were admitted to our communion." Charlestown, N. H., Cong. Church Rec.)

Simon and Stephen Alvord were citizens here at an early day. It is said that they built the two cottages so similar in architectural structure, one of which was occupied for many years by the late Samuel Crosby, the other by Capt. Green. They left previous to 1792. Only Parthenia's birth is on the town records." (Hist. of Charlestown, N. H.)

By the U. S. census of 1790 and 1800 Stephen Alvord was a resident of Woodstock, Vt., those years. He moved to Canada where he died. Mrs. Alvord returned to Vermont and was received by letter from the church in Woodstock, Vt., to the church in Windsor, Vt.
