C., Oct. 16, 1884; married Rutland, Vt., Sept. 17, 1846, Emily Louise Mussey, daughter of Henry and Amanda (Lawrence) Mussey. She was born Rutland, Vt., May. 26, 1826; died Washington, D. General Benjamin Alvord served for fifty-two years on the active list of the United States Army, passing through all the grades from Cadet to Brigadier General. Participated in the Florida and Mexican wars, the war of the Rebellion, as well as various Indian Campaigns, and was brevetted successively Captain, Major, Lieutenant, Colonel, and Brigadier General, for gallantry in action.

He was appointed a cadet at the United States Military Academy in 1829, graduated July, 1833, and was commissioned on that date a Brevet 2d Lieutenant in the 4th U. S. Infantry. Joining his regiment in the field in Florida he served with it for two years against the Seminole Indians, being engaged in several Campaigns and was then sent back to West Point for a period of two years as assistant Professor of Mathematics and Principal Assistant Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy.

From 1839 until the beginning of the Mexican War in 1846, Mr. Alvord was with his regiment on the frontier in Arkansas and the Indian Territory, again in Florida, where he participated in an ex-
