Among its numerous institutions may be named Independence Hall, the University of Pennsylvania, Jefferson, and other medical colleges, Girard College, Drexel Institute, Franklin Institute, Academy of Natural Sciences, Academy of Fine Arts, Philadelphia Library, the magnificent new City Hall, and Fairmount Park, the largest and most picturesque pleasure ground in the United States.</i>
