## LEWIS BAYLY, BISHOP OF BANGOR.

Lewis Bayly, Bishop of Bangor, who married Judith, sister of Samuel Appleton I., was the author of a work of great popularity entitled "The Practice of Piety, directing a Christian how to walk that he may please God," which was remarkable for its puritanical sentiments, coming from a Bishop. The following particulars relating to him are taken from Woods Athenæ Oxonienses.

Lewis Bayly, Bishop of Bangor, was born in Cæmerthen in Wales. He was of Exeter College, Oxford; afterwards minister of Evesham in Worcestershire; chaplain to Prince Henry, and minister of St. Matthews church in Friday Street, London. Being famed for his eminence in preaching, he was made one of the chaplains to King James I. who nominated him Bishop of Bangor. He was consecrated at Lambeth, 1616. He published the "Practice of Piety, directing a Christian how to walk that he may please God," printed about forty times in 8vo. and 12mo. The eleventh edition was printed in London in 1619.\* It
