

Burke, in his "General Armory," gives arms:

"PYNCHON. (Writtle, County Essex.) Per bend argent and sable; three roundles within a bordure engrailed; counterchanged. Crest: A tiger's head, erased argent."

These arms are like those given Pynchon in the Herald's visitations of Essex in 1612 and 1634 (see post-pages 203 and 204), but the crest is there a tiger's head erased azure crined or.

The cut herewith is taken from "Suckling's Memorials of County Essex," London, 1845, where it accompanies the following inscription:



"Here lyeth y<sup>e</sup> body of John Pynchon,  
"of Writtle, Esq<sup>r</sup>, son of Sir Edward  
"Pynchon, of Writtle, Knt., who de-  
"parted this life y<sup>e</sup> 30 day of part July, 1654;  
"and also y<sup>e</sup> body of Edward Pynchon, Gent., son of y<sup>e</sup> said John  
"Pynchon, Esq<sup>r</sup>, who departed this life y<sup>e</sup> 12 day of Feb'y, 1672; and  
"also y<sup>e</sup> body of Ann Pynchon, wife of y<sup>e</sup> said John Pynchon, Esq<sup>r</sup>.  
"who departed this life y<sup>e</sup> 10 day of May, 1675."
