Philippe De La Noye (Delanoy or de Lannoy) b. Leiden 1602 bapt. 1603 d. Philippe De la Noye, Leyden Holl 1602 son of Jean and Marie de Lannoy, of French protestant faith (Huguenots) who to escape the prosecutions of the Catholic party then in power went to Leiden He was baptized there in the Walloon Church 1603 and grew up under the teaching and influence of the separatists of the established Church of England who fled to Holland in 1608 taking up their abode in Leyden.

It is not definitely shown by any authority on the subject whether Philip was one of the passengers on the Speedwell or not, which Bradford says set sail on that vessel; of sixty tons burden from Delfthaven to Southampton England on or about the 1st day of August 1620 and on the 15th both the Mayflower and Speedwell with one hundred and twenty passengers on board some
