FRANCES LULU ALVORD (*Harvey, Asahel, Thomas Gould, Asahel, Thomas, Thomas, Alexander*), born Cosumnes River, Cal., June 11, 1852; married Idaho Springs, Colo., Feb. 5, 1873, Lewis Clinton Rockwell, son of Lewis and Mary (Brand) Rockwell. He was born Esperance, N. Y., Jan. 13, 1840; died Berthoud, Colo., Jan. 10, 1897. Res. Central City, Colo., and Denver, Colo. Children:

Lewis Clinton Rockwell was of a family of lawyers and he attained an enviable reputation at the bar in Colorado. He graduated from the Chicago Law School and went from Beloit, Wis., to Colorado, in 1862. His marked ability was clearly shown in his service as a member of the Constitutional Convention of Colorado, which framed laws for the new state, and also before the U. S. Supreme Court at Washington, where he argued several cases with ability. His untimely death, due to the kick of a horse, removed from life one of the ablest lawyers in the state of Colorado. His widow resides in Denver, Colo., 1906.
