Clarence Walworth Alvord was educated in the schools of Northampton, Mass.; graduated from Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass., in 1887; from Williams College in 1891. He then taught for two years at Milton, Mass., in the Milton Academy. In the summer of 1893 he went abroad to study, spending two years at Berlin in the study of history, also two quarters at Chicago. In 1898 he was appointed instructor in the preparatory school of the University of Illinois, in 1900 instructor of history in the university, and is now (1908) Asst. Prof. of History in the university, having taken the degree P. H. D. from the university in 1908. Mr. Alvord is editor of the publications of the Ill. State Historical Library, published Vol. II of the Ill. Hist. Collection, with subtitle of Cahokia Records—Introduction and French Records, also numerous pamphlets on western history. He has also recently edited with Dr. C. E. Carter, the "Invitation Serieuse aux Habetants des Illinois," which is Vol. IV of the Club for Colonial Reprints; "Genesis of the Prolamation of 1763" pub. by Mich. Pioneer Soc.; "Spanish Conquest of St. Joseph in 1782," pub. by Mo. State Hist. Soc.

Mr. Alvord is a member of the American Historical Ass'n, the Illinois Historical Soc., corresponding member of the Nebraska Historical Society and the Missouri State Historical Society and an honorary member of the Missouri Historical Society. He is president of the Mississippi Valley Historical Ass'n for the year 1908-9.
