Everett Morton Alvord had a common school education, and began railroading at the age of fifteen in Ill. on the old Ohio and Miss. Ry. In the latter part of 1876 he went to Texas, and for a number of years after he held various positions with several railroads and construction companies. He was interested and engaged in the construction of a large proportion of the present Texas railroad mileage. From 1880 until 1888 he was mostly on the frontier. The town of Alvord, Wise Co., Tex., was named in his honor, when he was foreman of a construction gang. It is now a flourishing village of a thousand inhabitants, although at the time it received the name, it had but one farm house and a cotton-gin. In 1888 Mr. Alvord was elected Grand Chancellor of the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, of Texas, and the two years following served as Supreme Representative. In June, 1903, he removed to Parsons, Kan., to take charge of the Kansas lines of the Mo., Kan. and Tex. R. R. In Sept. of the same year he removed to St. Louis as Gen. Supt. of the Mo., Kan. and Texas R. R., and continues to hold this position. Mr. Alvord is a Republican in politics.
