Henrietta Clay, eldest child of Lucretia Hart and Hon. Henry Clay, died in infancy.

Theodore Wythe Clay, eldest son of Lucretia Hart and Hon. Henry Clay, was born July 3, 1801. At the age of sixteen he met with an accident, by which his skull was fractured. He subsequently became insane, and died in the asylum at Lexington in 1871.

Thomas Hart Clay, second son of Lucretia Hart and Hon. Henry Clay, was born September 22, 1803; and married Maria Montelle, of Lexington, Kentucky. In 1861 he was elected to the Legislature, and in 1862 was appointed by President Lincoln Minister to Central America, and died at his home, Mansfield, near Lexington, beloved and honored by all.

Lucretia Hart Clay, eldest daughter of Thomas Hart Clay and Maria Montelle, born April 20, 1839; married in 1859 William C. P. Breckinridge, son of Dr. Robert J. Breckinridge, of Lexington, Kentucky, and died the same year, leaving an infant, which did not long survive her.

Henry Boyle Clay, Captain in the Confederate army, was born November 13, 1840, and married Mrs. Bynum, of Hawkins county, Tennessee.
