

Joseph<sup>7</sup> Stowell Moody (Capt. Samuel<sup>6</sup>, William<sup>5</sup> Pepperrill, Edmund<sup>4</sup>,  
Joshua<sup>3</sup>, Caleb<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>)

Joseph Stowell Moody was born in Saco Dec. 10, 1827 married Mary Louisa Wakefield Nov. 29, 1859 and died Aug. 17, 1905 His grandfather William Pepperrill Moody was born in Kittery Nov. 16, 1741 of Edmund Moody and Mary Jackson, daughter of George Jackson and neice of Sir William Pepperrill. William Pepperrill Moody built the first meeting house in Saco (then called Pepperrillborough) He married Sept 20, 1763 Elizabeth, daughter of Samuel Scammon

In 1697 Saco was attacked by Indians. A party of five was chopping wood on Cow Island, two were killed and the others, Lieut Fletcher and his two sons were carried off as prisoners. Two miles up river from the sea was the Scammon home. The ten year old son was going to then father in the field with a mug of ale but was frightened back. The whole family was taken captive to Canada. The mug was in the possession of Joseph Stowell Moody in 1897.

William Moody was born Sept 12, 1751, married Eunice Jackson Dec 20, 1777 and died Oct 23 1844. He lived in Salisbury and had children;

- VII Joseph<sup>6</sup> born Dec 16 1798.

It is interesting to think that some of these children were no doubt school mates of Daniel Webster born in Salisbury Jan 18 1782
