

Prof. Daniel Denison Slade has Maj.-Gen. Daniel Denison's book called "The Irenicon," a very rare work, and he has also relics of the Rogers and Bromfield branch of Dudley descendants.

Silver caudle cup. Gift from Gov. John Leverett to his daughter Mary, wife of Paul Dudley, son of Gov. Thomas Dudley, and younger brother of Gov. Joseph Dudley. A coat of arms is enchased on it. Owned by Mrs. H. H. Bradlee.

Pair of silver sugar bowls, enchased with coat of arms, —once owned by Gov. Joseph Dudley or his son Hon. William Dudley. Owned now by Mrs. H. H. Bradlee.

Twelve teaspoons with Dudley crest enchased on them, handed down from Gov. Joseph Dudley. Owned by Mrs. H. H. Bradlee.

Gov. Joseph Dudley's finger ring of gold. Owned by Dudley H. Bradlee.

Ancestry of the Barons of Dudley, copied by Col. H. C. Dudley of Buffalo, from Dean Dudley's tables.

In a circular frame, four caps of infants made before the birth of the first child of William Dudley and Sarah (Williams) his wife. Several ruffles wrought or embroidered by that first child when she was thirteen years old, for her mother to wear to Commencement at Harvard. A silver teaspoon which was Sarah Williams'. The knitting sheath of wood and ivory, which belonged to this Dudley family through seven generations. All presented to the N. E. Historic Gen. Society by Mrs. Elizabeth C. Young of Medford, grandchild of William and Sarah (Williams) Dudley, Nov. 14, 1881.

A large engraving of Hon. Dudley Woodbridge, great-grandson of Gov. Thomas Dudley. Owned by Dr. W. E. Woodbridge.

Two autograph letters of Gov. Joseph Dudley to Col. Winthrop Hilton, 1707 and 1708. Col. Hilton was son of Ann Dudley, wife of Edward Hilton, Esq., and daughter of Rev. Samuel Dudley, son of Gov. Thomas Dudley. Owned by D. Dudley.

Dudley coat of arms. This was designed by Col. Harry C. Dudley. Gov. Thomas Dudley bore the lion single tailed and Gov. Joseph Dudley bore the lion with a forked tail. The Sutton Dudleys had borne the lion both ways. The motto was used by Gov. Joseph. Perhaps he was the first
