SOME INTERESTING FACTS OF HIS TIME.

1697—1756.

At the celebration of the two-hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Parish of Trinity Church, New York, the thoughts of the writer turned to those in this church's early history who had done so much for it, and he asked himself, where were many of them buried, and what were the inscriptions on their monuments.
