1. **John Temple**, of whom later.

2. **Rev. Thomas Temple**; ¹ Fellow of Trinity College, Dublin; presented March 6th 1626-27, to the Rectory of Old Ross, in the Diocese of Fernes; in 1634 he was instituted of Battersea, co. Surrey, in which parish he was still until 1639; ² in 1641 he became a prominent preacher in London, and later a frequent preacher before the Long Parliament; one of the Assembly of Divines; an adventurer in Ireland, and by subscribing the sum of £450, had assigned to him 750 acres in the county Westmeath. The Rev. Thomas Temple died probably prior to 1671; he left no will; he was buried in his wife's family vault under the aisle in the Church of St. Lawrence at Reading, Berks; he married Anne, of a family from Reading; she died, probably in 1683, and was buried with her husband; her will, dated London, January 19th, 1679-80, was proved May 4th, 1683 (64 Drax.); ³ they had issue two daughters, ⁴ Frances Temple, who married ——— Woodward, of Reading, the other daughter married Rev. William Durham, Rector of St. Mildred, Bread Street, London, who at the time was probably a widower.

3. **Catherine Temple**; married; 1st, John Archdall, of Castle Archdall, co. Fermanagh, Esq.; 2dly, prior to December 1626, Sir John Vell, Kt.; she died November 13th 1642; buried on the 15th inst. in St. Warbrogh's Church, Dublin.

4. **Mary Temple**; married Job Ward, of Knockragh, co. Wicklow, Esq.; she died December 24th 1627.

5. **Martha Temple**; never married; died December 6th 1675; buried in St. Warbrogh's Church, Dublin.

⁴ It has been stated that the Rev. Thomas Temple was the ancestor of the Line of Mount-Temple, of co. Westmeath, but I have met with no evidence indicating that he left issue male.
