

with twenty others, took passage on the ship "Christian de Lo" (Joseph White, Master), March 16, 1634, which reached Boston Harbor the 20th of June following. Among the names appearing on the London Passenger Register was that of Thomas Barber, aged 21 (see Drake's Register of N. E. Founders). This is the first of the surname of "Barber" that I find who settled in New England; though, as appears from the London Passenger Register, a William Barber shipped from London, May 21, 1635, and settled first under the patronage of the Earl Carlisle at St. Christopher, Maine; also that an Edward died at Dedham, Mass., in 1644; also that an Edward died at Dorchester, June, 1677, aged 80 years. There was a George Barber at Dedham, who was prominent in military affairs and a freeman in 1647. He had a numerous family.

The first of the name in Virginia was a Henry and Francis, who, according to the London Register, shipped in the "Plain Joan" in 1620. Also a George, who came over in the ship "Transport" the same year. All settled and remained in Virginia. (The name is often spelled "Barbour," and "Barbar," and "Barbur," but all are spelled "Barber" in the London shipping lists of that period.)

The Stiles expedition remained at Dorchester until 1635, when, owing to the difference with the Established Church of Massachusetts Bay, it accompanied the Rev.
