

re-married prior to 1772 to William Lloyd, of Crowther's Hall, by whom she had a large family. During her life the Evans tenures were thus recorded in the Powis Rent-roll.

1772. "Thomas Evans, miller's widow, now William Lloyd."
 1777. "William Lloyd, late Thomas Evans."
 1780. "John Evans, Executor of late Thomas Evans."
 1794. "John Evans."

In 1791, the lease of Dyer's Farm was assigned to William Lloyd. This lease expired in 1817, on the death of John Evans, the last life named therein. The farm had been occupied by Evanses from 1634.

By the marriage settlement, dated 21 April, 1760, the Upper Mill property, described to be theretofore in the possession of Thomas Evans, deceased, late father of Thomas Evans, party thereto, but then in the occupation of Elizth. Evans, widow, was strictly entailed by Thomas Evans, the bridegroom, on himself and his issue male in tail.

A few personal details attach to his memory. The silver buttons of his coat have already been mentioned. He had a racehorse called "The Dusty Miller" which ran at Chester Races, on the 6th May, 1761, whither he took his young wife, then aged 19.⁵ His death on 23 Jan., 1766, at the early age of 45, was caused by a surfeit of nuts. He had expressed great anxiety that he should be buried in a place where his bones should not be disturbed, and directed his widow to ask the then Earl of Powis to permit his remains to be interred under the Powis family seat in Welshpool Church. The request was made and granted, in consequence of the long tenure of the deceased's family as lessees of the Earls. A brass plate near the pew perpetuates his memory, and, by the age given, identifies the subject with the babe of 1721. Administration was granted to the widow, 10 Mar, 1766.

The only issue of the marriage was:—

THOMAS EVANS, born in 1762, and baptized at Welshpool Church, formerly living at the Upper Mill, afterwards in Broad Street, Welshpool, and subsequently at Oswestry. He was one of three persons who were
