XXX. Jonathan Boardman, second son of Joseph Boardman and Rachel Killam, b. Aug. 8, 1751, m. Priscilla Safford of Griswold, Conn., about 1770; was a ship-builder at Poquitanuck on the Thames a little below Norwich, and some of the time sailed in command of the ships to the West Indies and ports of the South, where he would sell his ships.

He sold 108 acres of land in the town of Groton in 1789 to Henry Williams for £600. In a history of New London County, Conn., it is said that an association of 68 prominent men was formed in July, 1782, to suppress smuggling, and among them was Jonathan Boardman. He moved to Newburn, N. C., about 1787, leaving his sons Henry and Elisha with their grand parents in Preston. His wife died of cholera soon after, and he moved to Wilmington, N. C., where he re-married, had one son by his second wife, and died about 1791.
