I give and bequeath unto Grace Pine, my well beloved wife, the whole of my movable estate after my decease, except as much as shall be wanted to discharge all such just debts as I now, or may hereafter owe and leave due to any person or persons, funeral charges, legacies, etc., hereafter expressed. I also give her the improvement of all my real estate during her natural life; the personal estate over and above what I shall order to be paid out, etc. as above, I give to her as above said forever.

ITEM. I give unto my son Charles Pine, (if living,) the sum of five shillings.\*

ITEM. I give unto my daughter, Grace Rannels, one cow and calf, to be delivered to her at my wife's decease.†

GRACE PINE,<sup>2</sup> (Charles,<sup>1</sup>) dau. of Charles and Grace (—) Pine. Born———in Scarborough, Me. She was admitted to full communion in the First Parish, Sept. 24, 1732; to Second Parish, Apr. 1, 1745; married JOHN RANNELS or REYNOLDS; he may have been a descendant of Job Reynolds, who came from Scotland. The name is spelled in the old records Reynolds, Reinolds, Runals, Rannels and Runnells, for one and the same persons.

\*Charles Pine, Jr. is reported to have gone to England after an inheritance, after which nothing was heard from him in this country, the male line ending here probably, as George Pine's only son died young, and Isaac Pine was not married.

†Grace Rannels evidently had her share of the property previously, as per the following: York Registry, Book 17, page 138, Charles Pine conveys land on the Saco road west from Dunstan, "In consideration of parental love towards my well beloved son, John Reynolds and Grace Reynolds, the wife of said John." There are four others named in the will, to whom the bulk of the property went.
