JOHN MOORE,¹ born in Ireland; settled probably in Kittery, Me.; married, first, in 1742, JANE BOOTHBY; second,——; was a miller; moved to Scarborough, Me.

EBENEZER MOORE,² (John,¹) son of John and Jane (Boothby) Moore, born about 1746; m. REBECCA HODSDON; (see page 37.) Mr. Moore in company with his brother John, left Scarborough in 1774, and went into the wilderness, several miles beyond any known settlement. Mr. Moore settled on lot 16, first range of Parsons' purchase, on a swell of land in the southeast corner, near the Newfield line, on the south road. The line between Parsonstown and the plantation of Washington was not settled until the latter was incorporated as Newfield, in 1794, the first range of lots being claimed by Newfield, hence the names of Ebenezer and John do not appear on Parsonfield records till 1794, though they had lived
