

Shalford Hall to Samuel Husbands, Esq., of London, knighted in 1684, and constituted Deputy Lieutenant and Justice of the Peace. He re-built nearly the whole of the mansion house, and greatly improved the estate, which he sold in 1692 to John Moore, Knight, Alderman of London, and retired to the island of Barbadoes. Sir John, on whose decease in 1702, left this manor to his nephew, John Moore, Esq., of Kentwell Hall, who dying unmarried in 1713, it descended to his kinsman John Moore in 1714, from whom it was afterwards conveyed to James Raymond, Esq.

THE EAST WINDOW.

The east window of the chancel is probably commemorative of the above named Catherine Picot, and is a fine example of heraldic treatment of the 14th century.

The shields are arranged as shown in the accompanying sketch.

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- A. Gu. Three lions rampant. "Ross" or "Roos."
 - B. Northwood of Shalford. But the boar's head has been lost.
 - C. Paly wavy of six (or. and gu.). "Valence" or "Valoines."
 - D. Sa. billetty. or. Griffin seg. arg. "Picot."
 - E. Barry of six vert. and or. A bend gu. "Poynings."
 - F. Erm. a cross engrailed gu. "Northwood of Kent."
 - G. Vair. on a chief gu. Two mullets of six points. "Fitz Barnard."
 - H. Quarterly, or. and gu. A bend vair. "Sackville."
 - I. Erm. A cross engrailed gu., in dexter chief a boar's head, coupé or., armed or., *Northwood of Shalford.*

In the reign of Henry III. Royer de Ros, the King's taylor, held the Manor of Wallbury in Great Haling-bury.

William de Valence held the same in 1284. His son Adomer de Valence, Earl of Pembroke, died Jan. 23rd, 1323. The Arms of Sir
