In 1240 *Henry de Cambray* was rector of Gayton, Northampton, while, in 1265, *Simon de Cambray* was Vicar of Cottingham, in the same county. In 1292 a *Simon Caumbray* was appointed attorney for Peter, Prior of La Sele, going abroad, while in 1298 the King granted protection until Christmas for *Hugh de Cambray* and others accompanying Blanche, widow of Edmund, the King's brother, father of Thomas, Earl of Lancaster.

In 1312 we find a *Roger de Cambray* assisting Griffen de la Pole in his endeavour to oust Hawys, his niece and her husband, John de Charleton, from their castle and lands of Powys, on the ground that the former, as a female, could not inherit her father's land; and in 1313 in common with Griffen de la Pole, Laurence Gower, an ancestor of the Duke of Sutherland and others, this same Roger de Cambray obtained the King's pardon for having been concerned with Thomas, Earl of Lancaster, the King's cousin, in the murder of Piers Gaveston at Blacklow Hill, near Warwick, 19 June, 1312, and the troubles occasioned thereby.

From the Subsidy Rolls we learn that in 1316-17 an *Agnes de Combaray* held property in the parish of Smallhampton, Oxfordshire; that from 1327 to 1333 a *John Cambrey*, almost undoubtedly descended from William de Cambray, of Ashford, resided at Huntington, Shropshire, while in the latter year a *Simon Caumbray* lived at Shoreham, Sussex.

In 1348 or 1349 John Ponger, and Mary, his wife, made over property in Wilts, York, and Lincoln, to *William de Cambray* and Letitia, his wife, while in 1379 *John Cambray* gave over all his rights in Wassington and Fyndon and elsewhere in the county of Sussex to certain grantees, who were probably his trustees.

In 1358-9 King Edward III granted certain manors in the county of Wilts to *Richard de Caumbry*.
