

The next admission to the Roll of Freemen is that of Nicholas Lubbocke, admitted 19 December 1642. There is no mention of the name on a Muster Roll of all male persons between the ages of 16 and 60 in Norwich, A.D. 1595.

Among the MSS. of Mr. Zachary Lloyd, at Areley Hall, *Hist. MSS. Com. Tenth Report*, part iv., p. 450, is a letter from "I. H." to Thomas Le Gros at Norwich, dated 7 June 1666, describing the Duke of Albemarle's great sea-fight with the Dutch, saying, "Wheresover William Lubbock and his companions were, they saw sport enough." Who this may have been I have failed to ascertain. The name is transcribed erroneously in the Report as "Sir William;" there is no "Sir" in the original letter.

It is somewhat remarkable how seldom the name is met with outside Norfolk. The Indexes to the Wills at Somerset House do not contain a single instance, although there are several of the wills of the Norfolk Lubbocks. There are two Petitions among the Treasury Papers, vol. xxxi., No. 23, and vol. lxii., No. 68, from Samuel Lubbocke of Bristol, A.D. 1694, who appears to have taken part in the Revolution of 1688.

Although the first purchase of the Lamas property appears to have been made by the Rev. William Lubbock in 1738, directly after his appointment to the Rectory, there was a Paul and
