After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Goelet moved up to Wappingers to live, and a portion of the farm was given to Aunt Eliza. Thomas Goelet built a house on her portion of the farm, in which they lived; his brother Philip Goelet lived with them. At Aunt Eliza's death she left two children. Thomas Goelet died soon after his wife, leaving his wife's property and his own to his nephew, Peter Goelet, of New York City. Peter Goelet placed the children under the care of Doctor Remsen, with whom they remained until their deaths a few years after. Peter Goelet, very soon after the death of his Uncle Thomas Goelet, sold all the property at Wappingers Creek to Mr. Clapp.

Up to this period, notwithstanding the apparent distance from New York compared with the present, the Home at Wappingers Creek was a favorite place to visit, for all the family.
