

She would also relate stories about the Indians, who were frequently seen about the Sadawga Pond, which still bears its Indian name, and upon whose southern border lies the farm where their cabin was first built and where they lived and died.

NATHAN GREENE was a man of great physical strength and intellectual development, energetic and ambitious, always ready with a joke, yet of great will power and decision of character, which attributes appear characteristic of the Greene family.

He was quite an extensive land-owner. The records of the town show that he sold in 1785 and during the following years, tracts of land or farms to nine different persons. March 20, 1822, having become old and somewhat infirm, he sold his homestead to David Hosley, jr. (his son-in-law), taking back a life lease of the premises.
