**William Denison**,<sup>477</sup> b. 1586 ± Eng., d. 25 Jan., 1653, Roxbury, Mass.; m. Margaret ———<sup>478</sup> who d. 23 Feb., 1645. In 1631 he came to New England in the ship "Lion" with his family and also his children's tutor John Eliot, who afterwards became the apostle to the Indians. He was a merchant, and a deacon of the church in Roxbury.

**Capt. George Denison**,<sup>479</sup> son of William,<sup>477</sup> b. 1618, Eng.; d. 23 Oct., 1694, Hartford; m. 1645 his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife Ann Borrodell<sup>480</sup> (b. 1615; d. 26 Sept., 1712) daughter of John Borrodell<sup>481</sup> of Cork, Ireland, but who was then living near the battlefield of Naseby. George came with his father in the "Lion" 1631; but his first wife dying, he returned to England served with distinction under Cromwell; at Naseby he was severely wounded, taken to the house of John Borrodell,<sup>481</sup> nursed by his daughter Ann<sup>480</sup> whom he afterwards married. Again coming to New England he settled near Stonington.

During King Philip's war he was a leader in ten expeditions against the Indians, in one of which he captured Canochet.

**Margaret Denison**,<sup>442</sup> dau. of George,<sup>479</sup> b. 1659; m. 5 June, 1676, to James Brown, jr.,<sup>441</sup> of Swansey, where they resided.
