

## YORKSHIRE.

One of the Hampshire family, Nicholas de Punchardon, appeared with eleven other jurors in an enquiry concerning the right of William de Rossell to certain lands in Haselby, before the Justices in Eyre, 7° Edward I. (1279).<sup>71</sup>

Eudo de Punchardon, "son of Sir Roger,"<sup>72</sup> was Lord of the Manor of Queneby in the thirteenth century, and apparently died without issue. He founded the chantry of St. Agatha in York Cathedral, in 1287, for two Chaplains, and endowed it with the Manor of Grimston, leaving the presentation to the Vicars thereof. The altar was on the south side of the crypt.

In 1364 the service was stopped "propter novam fabricam." Inventories of its furniture are dated 1360, 1364, and 1520.<sup>73</sup>
