All my goods to Gregorye Lawrence, except xii^d to George Botefielde, to buy him a lamb, xv^d to John Combe, and vii^d to Thomas Paddon. Executor, Gregorye Lawrence.

Dated 13 Apl: 1602. Proved 17 May, 1602.

George Pouchard, of Fremyngton, yeoman.

I geve all unto my wiffe Elizabeth, whome I make sole executrix.

Dated 25 Apl: 1605. Proved 1 July, 1607. Inventory soma xxiiⁱ xvijⁱ x^d.

Paul Punchard, of Marton, husbandman.

Unto daughter, Elizabeth Weekes, ffortie shillings and my greatest panne. To daughter Alis Rowse, twentie shillings. Unto the foresaide Allis Rowse's daughter, on ewe sheepe. Unto my sonne Thomas Punchard's tow daughters, on sheepe a peece. Rest of goodes absolutely unto Thomas Punchard, son, and executor.

Date lost. Proved 15 Jan: 1611. Inventory, suma totr: xxvⁱ viiiⁱ iii^d.

Anthonye Puncharde, of Tawstocke, husband-laborer.

Unto my sonne Nycholas Puncharde my beste pane and a posneat; residue unto Rychouarde⁶ my wife, whole executrix. Witnessed by Willyam Puncharde.

Dated 30 Nov: 1619. Proved May 31, 1620. Inventory 'praised; some totalis iiiijⁱ xvijⁱ iv^d.

Agnis Punchard, of Tawstocke.

To daughter Marie my bedde, etc., item one brasyn panne; the rest to my sonne, Walter Punchard, whole executor.

Dated 20 Apl: 1631. Proved 24 May, 1631. Inventory som £5.8.000.

Walter Punchard, of Huntshaw, husbandman.

Unto Ellonor Punchard, my now wife, one oken coffer with three leggs, now standing in the chamber where I doe lye. All the rest of my goodes unto my sonne George, my executor.

Dated 21 Sept: 1635, with 'the signe of Walter Pu'chard.' Proved 8 Jan: 1635. Inventorie, sum total, £19.10.00.

Also the "obligacion of Elianora Punchard, vid. et Johan Penhorwood de Horwood in com: Devon: yeoman, 7 Jan: 1635, duran' minori etate of George Punchard, sonne of y^e deceased".⁷
