JOHN CONNY, THE GOLDSMITH.

JOHN CONNY, goldsmith, by his first wife, Sarah, had four sons and one daughter, all of whom died before July 16, 1690. They also had a daughter, Sarah, b. May 9, 1691, who married Samuel Gerrish, May 8, 1712. By his second wife (Mary Attwater, widow of John Clark), he had four daughters, —

Mary, b. Nov. 7, 1695, a spinster.

Anna, b. Jan. 23, 1697; m. Rev. Thomas Foxcroft, March 19, 1718.

Mehitable, b. Jan. 16, 1698; m. Francis Foxcroft, Nov. 5, 1722.

Abigail,¹ b. June 5, 1700; m. Edward Bromfield, Jr., Feb. 21, 1722.

He died August, 1722, aged sixty-seven years, and in the Selectmen's Minutes of Sept. 24, 1722, "liberty was granted for a tomb to be built for him in the South Burying-Place, on the south line, No. 20," the name of which has since been changed to "Granary Burying-Ground."²

He was the son of John Conny, cooper, of Boston, who married Elizabeth Nash, June 20, 1654, being their first-born child; born Jan. 5, 1655 (O. S.)
