

Mrs. Elizabeth Granger, a daughter of John, was living in Massachusetts in 1847.

(NOTE. The following telegram, which appeared in a New York paper, explains itself):

"Pittsfield, Mass., Feb. 4, 1888. Mrs. Elizabeth Granger died here to-day at one o'clock at the age of nearly 103 years. She was born in Northampton, Mass., May 8, 1785. Her maiden name was Kelton. She came to Pittsfield in 1810, when she married Bernice Granger, who died in 1813, since which time she has lived on Penn street. She is thought to have been the oldest woman in the State. She was a member of the First Congregational Church for 66 years, and remembered distinctly when Lafayette visited Pittsfield."

9. JOHN KILTON. Private. Enlisted in 1812. Served one year at the Fort in Machias, Maine. Capt. Holmes Nash; and Col. Cobb.

He married Sarah Sawyer, June 16, 1810. He died Dec. 17, 1854. He married, enlisted, and died in Jonesboro, Maine.

He was born Jan. 8, 1787, and was a son of Benjamin⁴ (Jonathan,⁴ Jonathan,³ Thomas,² Thomas¹).

10. WILLIAM KELTON. Private. A sailor before enlistment. Enlisted May 21, 1812. Capt. H. H. Watson, 3d U. S. Artillery.

11. GUSTAVUS F. KILTON. Private. Enlisted Nov. 11, 1812. Capt. Holmes Nash, Mass. Militia. Discharged at Robbinston, Maine, Nov. 11, 1813. Married Hannah H. Farnsworth, in 1817. Enlisted, married and died in Jonesboro, Maine.

He was born Oct. 10, 1795, and was a son of Benjamin⁴ (Jonathan,⁴ Jonathan,³ Thomas,² Thomas¹).

12. EBENEZER⁴ KELTON. Private. Enlisted for five years, March 16, 1813. Capt. Henry Leavenworth, and Capt. John B. Murdock, 25th Regiment of U. S. Infantry.

He was living in Montreal, Canada, at the breaking out of the War of 1812.

He died in the service Nov. 30, 1813, from wounds received in battle at Chrystler's Fields, Upper Canada, Nov. 11, 1813.

He was a son of James⁴ (Enoch,⁴ John,³ Thomas,² Thomas¹).
