

**REGIMENTAL STANDARDS.**—It was enacted by the Legislature that the eight regiments of '75 should be distinguished by flags of different colors, as follows: 1st regiment yellow; 2nd regiment blue; 3rd regiment scarlet; 4th regiment crimson; 5th regiment white; 6th regiment azure; 7th regiment blue (?); 8th regiment orange.

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### LEXINGTON ALARM.

From the list of Men who marched from Connecticut towns "for the relief of Boston in the Lexington Alarm," April, 1775, appear the following names.

#### FROM THE TOWN OF KILLINGLY.

**SAMUEL PRINCE**, Private, number of days in service, seven.  
**ROBERT PRINCE**, Private, number of days in service, seven.

#### FROM THE TOWN OF NEW LONDON.

**WILLIAM PRINCE**, Sergeant, number of days in service, eight.

**NOTE.**—There also appears on the public records of Connecticut the following: (October, 1779.) "This assembly do establish **WILLIAM PRINCE** to be Lieutenant of the 13th Company or Trainband in the 3rd Regiment in this state

The 3rd Regiment was composed of companies from New London and Lyme.

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### FORMATION OF 1777-1781.

#### First Reg't Connecticut Line.

Raised from and after January 1st, 1777, for the new Continental army, to continue during the war. Enlisted mainly in New London county; rendezvous at New London. Took the field in Spring of '77 at Peekskill, N. Y., and remained there in camp until ordered, under Gen. McDougall, to Washington's army in Penn. September '77 engaged on the left flank at
