HANNAH WEBSTER² married Michael Emerson and had, among other children :

Hannah, b. in Haverhill, Massachusetts, December 23, 1657, and was married to Thomas Duston, December 3, 1677. This was the famous Hannah Duston, who, having been captured and carried away by the Indians, her infant child murdered before her eyes, rose in the night time, and by the assistance of her nurse, Mary (Corliss) Neff, who had been made captive at the same time, and a small captive boy, named Samuel Leonardson, slew ten of her captors, and having scalped them, made her escape down the Merrimac to her home in Haverhill. Her story is too well known to need farther elaboration here. Besides the infant killed by the Indians, she had twelve children, five sons and seven daughters, and has a numerous posterity.
