

became seventh wrangler; he had as a pupil, Lord Alwyne Compton, now Bishop of Ely. He was afterwards Curate of Battersea for a few years, and on the death of Mr. Bevan, in 1851, Richard Twining, his uncle, being well-known to Bishop Blomfield, applied to him for the living of Holy Trinity, Twickenham. The Bishop replied that "he had much pleasure in offering it to one of a family who had done so much for the Church in various ways." James accepted the living, and soon afterwards, in 1854, married Mary E. Bevan, a daughter of the first Incumbent. He remained there eleven years, when Mr. Byng, the Rector of Little Casterton, Rutlandshire, exchanged with him in 1862, and there he lived till his sudden death, in 1874, aged 53 years.
