

Frederic Ward Putnam, S.B., A.M., S.D., of Cambridge, Mass.; Harv. (Law. Sc.Sc.) 1862; Peabody Prof. Am. Archaeology and Ethnology, Curator Peabody Museum, Harvard Univ.; Curator Archaeology American Museum, New York; Chairman Com. of Anthropology, Univ. Calif.; member Mass. Historical Soc.; Legion of Honor (France); etc., born in Salem, 16 April, 1839.

Married, 1 June, 1864, Adelaide Martha Edmands, daughter of William Murrey and Martha Adams (Tapley) Edmands, of Cambridge, born 29 Dec., 1838, died 9 March, 1879. Married, 29 April, 1882, Esther Orme Clarke, daughter of John L. and Matilda (Shepard) Clarke, of Chicago.

Son of EBENEZER PUTNAM, A.B., of Salem; Harv. 1815; born at Salem, 6 Sept., 1797, died 3 April, 1876. Alderman, postmaster, horticulturist.

Married, 25 Sept., 1827, Elizabeth Ward, daughter of Nathaniel and Elizabeth (Ward) Appleton, of Salem. She was born 10 July, 1804, died 27 April, 1887.

Son of EBENEZER PUTNAM, A.M., of Salem; Harv. 1785; born at Salem, 1768, died 25 Feb., 1826. Shipowner, merchant.

Married, 13 Nov., 1796, Elizabeth, daughter of Gen. John and Lydia (Phippen) Fiske, of Salem. She was born 19 July, 1778, and died March, 1808. His first wife Sarah, sister of the above, who died 7 Jan., 1795, had two children who died in infancy.

Son of EBENEZER PUTNAM, A.M., of Salem; Harv. 1739; born at Salem, baptized 20 Oct., 1717, died 12 Aug., 1788. Physician. Justice of the Peace. In 1776, he accompanied, as surgeon, the company of volunteers for the defence of Rhode Island from Salem. Member of the first Committee of Safety and Correspondence formed at Salem in 1775.

Married, 28 Oct., 1764, Margaret, daughter of John and Elizabeth (Pratt) Scollay, of Salem, bapt. 6 Dec., 1724, at Marblehead, died April, 1808.

Son of JAMES PUTNAM, of Salem, born 1689, will proved 14 Jan., 1763/4.

Married (published 15 Jan., 1714/5) Ruth, daughter of Col. John and Ruth (Gardner) Hathorne, of Salem, bapt. Sept., 1694, died 20 Feb., 1761.

Son of JAMES PUTNAM, of Salem, born 4 Sept., 1661, died 7 April, 1727. Lieutenant. He was the first in this branch of the family to send a son to Harvard. His son Archelaus, an undergraduate, died 14 May, 1718.

Married Sarah, daughter of John and Sarah (Woodman) Brocklebank, of Rowley, born 11 Sept. 1664, died 25 Dec., 1717. He married, 6 March, 1719-20, Mary, widow of Daniel Rea.

Son of JOHN PUTNAM, of Salem, baptized at Aston Abbots, Bucks, 27 May, 1627, died at Salem, 7 April, 1710.

Married, 3 Sept., 1652, Rebecca Prince, sister of Robert Prince and stepdaughter of Col. John Gedney.

John Putnam was admitted freeman in 1665. He was a man of decided opinions and took a prominent part in town and church affairs. He served in King Philip's war; was commissioned lieutenant of the troop of horse, 7 Oct., 1678, and after 1687 is styled captain. He was deputy to the General Court several times between 1679 and 1692.

Son of JOHN PUTNAM, of Salem, who emigrated from Aston Abbots in 1641. He was baptized at Wingrave, Bucks, 17 Jan., 1579, died at Salem, 30 Dec., 1662.

Married, in England, Priscilla (probably Deacon), who died in Salem.

John Putnam, the emigrant, was well equipped for the work of founding a home in a new country, both in ability and financial resources. He was sixty-seven years of age when he was admitted to the church at Salem, in 1647.

His ancestry is proven for many generations. Briefly stated it runs as follows: *Nicholas, John, Richard, Henry, Nicholas* (of the Visitation record of 1574), *William* (of Puttenham, Sherfield, Penne, Warbleton, etc.), *Henry, William, Sir Roger, Henry, Roger, Thomas*. The last named lived in the time of Edward I., his probable ancestry is given in the *History of the Putnam Family in England and America* by Eben Putnam.

The name PUTNAM is the phonetic form of PUTTENHAM, a parish in Buckinghamshire, England, in which place the family held possessions from early times.

Arms—*Sable, crusilly fitchle Argent, a stork of the last.*

Crest—*A wolf's head Gules.*
