i. Nellie, b. Jan. 1, 1802; m. Jacob P. Brown (b. July 9, 1803), in New Jersey, May 19, 1825; d. April 7, 1876; he d. Dec. 9, 1874. Issue: 1. Henry, b. Sept. 21, 1827; d. April 25, 1876; 2. Ellen Jane, m. Abram Bogert, and lives at Passaic.

ii. Richard, b. Jan. 10, 1804.

iii. Jacob, b. Aug. 27, 1808; m. ——— Haynes; d. Jan. 12, 1890, s. p.

iv. James, b. March 7, 1810; he is a bachelor, living (1897) in Santander, Spain.

v. Cornelius, b. Sept. 25, 1813; m. Jeannette Ingals Kimball (a descendant of Elder Brewster, of Plymouth Colony, and of Governor Bradford, of Massachusetts), Nov. 17, 1841; they live in Houston, Tex., whither Col. Ennis removed about 1838.

¹ The name Ennis, Innis, etc., appears in the New York Dutch church records as early as 1683. The Rev. Alexander Innis was chaplain in New York in 1686. The first of the name in this neighborhood was William Ennis, who m. Antje (Annaetje) Brouwer, Nov. 13, 1726. He had issue:

Howe, the British commander, in 1777, for showing the American army across the Passaic river, above or below Acquackanonk Landing. (But see History of Paterson, p. 422.) He lived on the River road, near Bradbury's lane.

5. David, bap. Nov. 6, 1737.

6. Hendrik, b. May 26, 1740; m. Rebecca Simmonds, April 19, 1764. Ch. (prob.), Rebecca, m. Kemena Van Buren, Sept. 27, 1795.
