

church, on account of her recent injuries. This service was conducted by Bishop Leonard, and the simple, solemn and impressive service of the church was performed by the rector, Rev. George F. Smythe, Bishop Leonard and Rev. Dr. H. W. Jones of Gambier.

All of the business houses of the city were closed during the service as a mark of the high respect and esteem in which Mr. Delano was held, and the church was packed to the very doors long before the time by his many friends and admirers. The seats on either side of the center aisle were reserved for the relatives, friends, members of the bar, Kenyon college trustees, faculty and students, theological students and K. M. A. cadets. A detachment of the latter acting as escort, accompanying the remains to the church and forming a passage on either side of the walk during the services, and while the remains were exposed to public view, and also to the cemetery.

The remains were met at the door of the church by the clergy, who preceded them up the aisle, and the casket was deposited in front of the chancel while the solemn services were performed. Afterwards the casket was taken to the walk in front of the church, where it was opened and an opportunity given to the public to take a last lingering look at the honored friend of all, which was taken advantage of by many. The floral offerings on the casket were exquisite and were the gifts of loving friends.

The procession to the cemetery was an enormous one, and was headed by the K. M. A. cadets and Kenyon students on foot, the college faculty in carriages, members of the bar, pall-bearers and hearse, escorted by the K. M. A. detachment. Then followed the relatives and intimate friends, and a long line of the carriages and buggies of friends paying the last sad mark of respect. The remains were interred in the Delano lot in Mound View. James Israel acted as marshal, and the honorary pall-bearers were Hon. H. H. Greer, Judge J. B. Waight, J. S. Ringwalt, Henry L. Curtis, Charles E. Burr of Columbus and F. D. Sturges.

Yesterday morning, Mr. Hague of Columbus, an expert in that line, took a plaster cast of the features of Mr. Delano.
