Acquisition Notes

with interesting Jeffersonian associations have recently the Jefferson collection in the Library's Rare Book Division edition of Cicero's Epistolarum ad Quintum Fratrem printed at the Hague in 1725. This copy was purchased by De Bure Frères in Paris on June 4, 1820, and is listed in the catalog prepared for the auction of his library in Washington on February 27, 1829. His cypher appears on the first pagination and on pages 115 and 275 of the volume. Ultimately this copy found its way into the library of L. Steiner of Baltimore, who bequeathed it to the University of Maryland with the condition that it be listed as "from the collection of Henry Steiner." Bound in its original white vellum binding, the volume now joins a number of other volumes in the collection that were sold in Washington on that same

This association piece is a presentation copy of Charles of the War of the Independence of the United States of America in three volumes printed at Philadelphia by Lydia R. Maxwell in 1820 and 1821. This history was first pub-

lished at Paris in 1809 in Italian; President Jefferson received a copy of the first edition in 4 volumes from the author, and that copy remains today in the Jefferson collection which the Library of Congress acquired in 1815. In May 1816, Mr. Jefferson acquired a replacement copy for the library he was reconstituting at Monticello from De Bure Frères in Paris. A year later, on May 5, 1817, Jefferson referred to this copy, the present whereabouts of which are unknown, in a letter to his old friend John Adams:

I am now reading Botta's history of our own revolution. . bating the antient practice, which he has adopted, of putting speeches into mouths which never made them, and fancying motives of action which we never felt, he has given that history with more detail, precision and candor than any writer I have yet met with. it is to be sure compiled from those writers; but it is a good secretion of their matter, the pure from the impure, and presented in a just sense of right in opposition to usurpation.

The popularity of Botta's history induced George Alexander Otis of Philadelphia to undertake an English translation of the text, and it is a copy from this edition which the Library recently acquired at auction in New York. Presumably President Jefferson received two copies in installments as they were published. On August 26, 1820, he wrote to Louis H. Girardin: "Your favor of the 16th with the two volumes of Botta are safely received and I am much pleased to learn that you still contemplate the completion of your history of Virginia." Later that same year Jefferson acknowledged on Christmas Day the receipt of the second volume in an informative letter addressed to the translator, George A. Otis:

I have to thank you for the 2d vol. of your translation of Botta which I recieved (sic) with your favor of the 5th on my return home after a long absence. I join mr. Adams heartily in good wishes for the success of your labors, and hope they will bring you both profit & fame. you have certainly rendered a good service to your country; & when the superiority of the work over every other on the same subject shall be more known I think it will be the common Manual of our revolutionary history.

In a postscript he added: "I have just dispatched your two volumes to Mr. Botta, to whom I am sure they will be a gratification." Before their dispatch Jefferson inscribed the first of these two volumes: "To m<sup>r</sup>. Botta with the friendly & respectful devoirs of Th. Jefferson." Subsequently copies of the third volume reached his hands, and one of these was also inscribed--"For M. Botta with the respectful salutations of Th. Jefferson"--and apparently forwarded to the author in Paris. Volumes 1 and 2 carry Jefferson's cypher at the bottom of the first page of the initial signature of the text. The set is attractively bound with red leather backs tooled in gold and with lavender marbled paper sides. [Frederick R. Goff]

towards our University assure me he would willingly be. perhaps he would  
accept a copy of the Report, which I would ask you to present him in my name.

Jefferson was one of the subscribers to this edition, at the suggestion of James Pemberton of Philadelphia, who sent him the copy sold to the Library of Congress in 1815. See Sowerby 1400.

This book is entered in Jefferson's manuscript catalogue, but was not sold at auction in 1829.

Jefferson bought the work from Lackington through Richard Rush, at the time in England, to whom Jefferson wrote from Monticello on August 14, requesting him to get for him a number of books, including: Thomas's Coke Littleton a new & digested edition, Brooke, 23 Paternoster Row.

Rush replied on October 9 that "Law books being very costly, Thomas's edition of Coke Littleton is set down at £4. 4. though but three volumes . . ."

Lackington's bill, which included this work, 3 vol. 8vo. boards. £ 4. 4. is dated October 10, 1821.

Jefferson thought highly of this book and would have liked to have it published in the United States. On June 14, 1822 he wrote to N.P. Trist:

. . . I have received Thomas's new arrangement of Coke Littleton;

over

it is admirably executed. the whole matter of Coke & of Littleton is digested according to Blackstone's method, not omitting one word, to which are added the Notes of Lords Hale & Nottingham, of Hargrove and of Thomas himself and the subsequent cases on the same matters. it is now unquestionably the elementary book to be first read by every student, and is as easy and more profound than Blackstone . . .

On January 7, 1824 Jefferson wrote to Thos.<sup>W</sup> White of Richmond, Virginia:

. . . there is a new work in Law, published in England which will be of extensive use in this country among the lawyers. it is the Digest of Cook's Lit. by Thomas, a most masterly work, and which will become the first elementary book for a student, and indispensable in every lawyer library, it is in 3. large 8<sup>vo</sup>s of mostly small print & costs 4. G. in London. the printing of it could be a considerable undertaking. but it would be a safe one were there no danger of their printing a rival edn. to the North. the merit of the work is so great that this will probably be done . . .

White replied on August 31 and informed Jefferson that he was at length able to state to him that he was in possession of Thomas's Digest of Coke and Littleton., and that he had made a calculation of the expence of printing, binding and paper, and that it would come to \$10.000

Your favor of the 1<sup>st</sup> has been received, the three copies of the Economy of human life had before come to hand. the elegant little morsel of ~~virtue~~ morality had always been a great favorite of mine, and without pretending to be a critic in French style, I have no doubt you have done to the original in your translation. I am in your debt for the three copies which I shall be glad to discharge to anybody here for you, on account of your early departure. I think Mr Luane, who is to send me some books, would be so obliging, on application, as to pay for them, & put it into his account.

This copy was in the library of C.W. Frederickson, and was sold at auction of that library by Bangs and Co of New York in April 1886, lot r

Dear Mr. VanWingen:

You may recall that I came by the Rare Book Division recently to inquire if you could lay your hands on the notes and other papers used by the late Miss Millicent Sowerby in compiling her monumental catalogue of the Thomas Jefferson library. I am now writing to ask if those materials have been uncovered.

As I told you on the aforesaid occasion, I am in hopes that Miss Sowerby kept some record of how she came by the information supplied on page 199, volume V of the Catalogue, stating in entry 1362 that Dr. Joseph E. Fields owned the 1700 edition of Locke's Essay that was originally owned by Jefferson. Joe Fields tells me that he never owned the Jefferson copy, that Miss Sowerby never saw his books, that the copy of the 1700 Locke he had bore on the titlepage the signature of George Wythe.

How, in short, did Miss Sowerby come by the information that Fields had the Jefferson copy?

Am sorry to bother you about this, but a considerable sum of money is at stake.

## Acquisition Notes

Two works with interesting Jeffersonian associations have recently been added to the Jefferson collection in the Library's Rare Book Division. One is an edition of Cicero's Epistolarum ad Quintum Fratrem libri tres, printed at the Hague in 1725. This copy was purchased by Jefferson from De Bure Frères in Paris on June 4, 1820, and is listed as number 38 in the catalog prepared for the auction of his library that was held in Washington on February 27, 1829. His cypher appears on page 129 of the first pagination and on pages 115 and 275 of the second pagination. Ultimately this copy found its way into the library of the late Amy L. Steiner of Baltimore, who bequeathed it to the Library of Congress with the condition that it be listed as "from the library of Lewis Henry Steiner." Bound in its original white vellum with gold tooling, the volume now joins a number of other volumes in the Jefferson collection that were sold in Washington on that same occasion.

The second association piece is a presentation copy of Charles Botta's History of the War of the Independence of the United States of America, a work in three volumes printed at Philadelphia by Lydia R. Bailey and J. Maxwell in 1820 and 1821. This history was first pub-

lished at Paris in 1809 in Italian; President Jefferson received a copy of the first edition in 4 volumes from the author, and that copy remains today in the Jefferson collection which the Library of Congress acquired in 1815. In May 1816, Mr. Jefferson acquired a replacement copy for the library he was reconstituting at Monticello from De Bure Frères in Paris. A year later, on May 5, 1817, Jefferson referred to this copy, the present whereabouts of which are unknown, in a letter to his old friend John Adams:

I am now reading Botta's history of our own revolution. bating the antient practice, which he has adopted, of putting speeches into mouths which never made them, and fancying motives of action which we never felt, he has given that history with more detail, precision and candor than any writer I have yet met with. it is to be sure compiled from those writers; but it is a good secretion of their matter, the pure from the impure, and presented in a just sense of right in opposition to usurpation.

The popularity of Botta's history induced George Alexander Otis of Philadelphia to undertake an English translation of the text, and it is a copy from this edition which the Library recently acquired at auction in New York. Presumably President Jefferson received two copies in installments as they were published. On August 26, 1820, he wrote to Louis H. Girardin: "Your favor of the 16th with the two volumes of Botta are safely received and I am much pleased to learn that you still contemplate the completion of your history of Virginia." Later that same year Jefferson acknowledged on Christmas Day the receipt of the second volume in an informative letter addressed to the translator, George A. Otis:

I have to thank you for the 2d vol. of your translation of Botta which I recieved (sic) with your favor of the 5th on my return home after a long absence. I join mr. Adams heartily in good wishes for the success of your labors, and hope they will bring you both profit & fame. you have certainly rendered a good service to your country; & when the superiority of the work over every other on the same subject shall be more known I think it will be the common Manual of our revolutionary history.

In a postscript he added: "I have just dispatched your two volumes to Mr. Botta, to whom I am sure they will be a gratification." Before their dispatch Jefferson inscribed the first of these two volumes: "To m<sup>r</sup>. Botta with the friendly & respectful devoirs of Th. Jefferson." Subsequently copies of the third volume reached his hands, and one of these was also inscribed--"For M. Botta with the respectful salutations of Th. Jefferson"--and apparently forwarded to the author in Paris. Volumes 1 and 2 carry Jefferson's cypher at the bottom of the first page of the initial signature of the text. The set is attractively bound with red leather backs tooled in gold and with lavender marbled paper sides. [Frederick R. Goff]

John Cartwright (1740-1824) was a famous political reformer and strongly supported American independence; he lived for some years in Lincolnshire, hence probably the interest of the original buyer of the book.
