Rapin's history of England: he was one of ~~xxx~~ the 20. prosecuted with Horne Tooke; and published his history about that time; if there be an 8vo. edition, I should prefer it; if not, the original 4to may be sent.

Rush replied that Rapin's history in fifteen volumes could be had for £2. 12 and that he would send it. The volumes were included in a bill sent by Lackington, Hughes, Harding, Maver and Leopard on October 10, 1821: Rapin's History of England 15 vol. 8vo. neat. £2. 12. 6.

These two volumes are now in the Library of Congress, Manuscripts Division. They are a contemporary copy of the Court Book of the Virginia Company of London, made after it ceased to exist in 1824. Jefferson thus described the volumes in a letter to Hugh P. Taylor, written from Monticello On October 4, 1823:

. . . the only manuscripts I now possess are some folio volumes. two of these are the proceedings of the Virginia Company in England; the remaining 4. are the Records of the Council of Virginia from 1622. to 1700. the account of the two first volumes you will see in the preface to Stith's history of Virginia. they contain the records of the Virginia co. copied from the Originals, under the eye, if I recollect right of the Earl of Southampton, a member of the company. bought at the sale of his library by Doct. Byrd of Westover, and sold with that library to Isaac Zane. these volumes happened, at the time of the sale to have been borrowed by Colo. R. Bland, whose library I bought, and with this they were sent to me. ~~xxxxxx~~ I gave notice of it to mr Zane, but he never reclaimed them. I shall deposit them in the library of the University, where they will be most likely to be preserved with care. the other 4. volumes, I am confident, are the original Office records of the council. my conjectures are, that when Sir John Randolph was about to begin the History of Virginia which he meant to write, he borrowed these volumes from the Council office to collect them material for his work. he died before he had made any progress

in that work, and they remained in his library, probably unobserved, during the whole life of the late Peyton Randolph, his son, from his executors I purchased his library, in a lump, and these volumes were sent to me as a part of it. I found the leaves so rotten as often to crumble ~~to~~ into dust on being handled. I bound them therefore together that they might not be unnecessarily opened, and have thus preserved them 47. years. . .

Religious pamphlets were sent to Jefferson from time to time. One I have not been able to find to date in any bibliography. It was by P. B. Tindell, who wrote to Jefferson on April 13, 1824:

Permit me with this letter to present you with a pamphlet entitled the American Free ~~Enquirer~~ thinker, which I am in hopes you ~~will~~ will do me the honor to accept and peruse. The object of this publication is to point out some of the objections that seem to exist in the most popular and prevalent religious creeds in the United States, Also to illustrate more fully the views of a larger Work, which I intend publishing at some future period. The distinguished part you have always acted in promoting science, and whatever tends to the improvement of the human mind, are sufficient reasons to induce a belief that you will not discourage the undertaking, even if you should doubt my abilities to perform. I should therefore be happy to hear from you, and to know your opinion, as soon as you can make it convenient to write - That you may still continue to diffuse (sic) the blessings of light and knowledge upon our happy country, and enjoy every felicity in this life, and in the next to come is the sincere wish of . . . P. B. Tindell.

Jefferson replied from Monticello on April 20, 1824:

I duly received your favor of the 13th and with it the pamphlet which you were so kind as to send me. but your request to give my opinion on it I

must pray your permission to decline. from this office I have universally excluded myself. I have neither the time, the talents nor the taste to become a Reviewer of books. my inclinations lead me to a very different choice of occupation. I have ceased also to subscribe for books yet to be published. at the age of 81. it would be an act of presumption to expect to live to see them. yet I should wish you to proceed in that which you propose as I am pleased with every effort to restore the primitive and genuine doctrine of Jesus, and to overwhelm the corruptions which have been introduced solely to answer the worldly purposes of those who preach them . . .

Rx The Riley volume was a presentation copy to ~~taxx~~ Jefferson from the author, who has written on the fly-leaf: "Hon. Thomas Jefferson Late President of the United States from his most devoted grateful and obedient servant James Riley Washington, June 9, 1819. Initialled by Jefferson on page iii.

Captain Paddock wrote his book at the request of Captain Riley, and several editions were published in 1818, some of them stating on the title-page that they were printed for Captain Riley. It seems natural therefore that the two books should be issued in one volume. The American Antiquarian Society has a copy of the two books in one volume, but the edition of Captain Paddock's book is a different one from the one in the Library of Congress. The Riley book is the third edition in both libraries.

Jefferson's copy was sent to him by the author, Thomas Bellings Robertson, to whom Jefferson wrote from Monticello on November 17, 1819:

I have to thank you for ~~your~~ the copy of your letters from Paris. I had read most of them in the newspapers, but have read them again with additional pleasure. they contain the expressions of reason and of genuine Americanism, revolting at the servility of the European character, so degraded by their slavish form of government . . .

The letters are dated from June 10, ~~1814~~ to September 27, 1815

You will perceive, if you will do me the favor to read the original essays, (which I will designate) in the Moral Instructor, as well as to examine the selections carefully, that my predominant object, in publishing the work, has been to enforce the moral and political necessity of the universal diffusion of knowledge, and of the univesal institution of free circulating libraries for that purpose. I have long wished that the board of managers of the literary fund in the State of Virginia, would consider whether the establishment of free libraries, connected with common schools, as well as other seminaries, would not accord with the system of public instruction intended by the legislature. If not, the legislature might, if deemed expedient, grant special authority

for that purpose. - Elementary schools are the keys, but libraries are the chest of knowledge.

If you should approve the design and sentiments of the Moral Instructor, please to submit it, with your own opinion, to the consideration of the managers of the Virginia Literary fund. A copy-right has been secured; - But in order to encourage its general and speedy adoption, and also to extend its utility, I have determined that, in case it be approved generally, as a national manual of morals, for the use of schools; booksellers, or others, are permitted to publish in each of the states, from five to ten thousand copies, free of any tax on the copy-right; and afterwards, any number at ten dollars per thousand.

You will perceive by the certificate of copy right, that one part of the first edition. (which was selected from Volney's "Law of Nature",) is excluded from the second edition. - This was not done voluntarily; - but by the request of Mr Hawley, the former Superintendent of common schools in the State of New York, who threatened the work with opposition and proscription, unless thus modified. - But, as I estimate the perfection of all systems of laws, religions, morals and philosophy, in proportion to the concurrence with the laws of nature, or in other words, the laws of the Creator; - and as the secretary of the state of New York, Mr Yates, who is now superintendent of schools, ex officio, and the most eminent instructor of academies and schools in the State of New York, as well as other citizens of high responsibility have signified their cordial satisfaction with the work as originally published; it is my intention to restore the selections from the "Law of Nature," in future Editions; - taking care, however, (as I endeavored to do in the first edition) to omit such sentiments of the author, as clash with the tenets of the Christian Religion. - Still, I do not anticipate gratifying, entirely, the taste of those who execrate all ancient, or modern philosophy, as vile trash, which is not the product of miraculous divine inspiration. - It is my intention also to add Dr Franklin's Dialogue on Modern Philosophy and some extracts from Cicero.

Your sentiments, frankly expressed, respecting the merits and defects of my book, or any suggestions of improvements on it, will be received with gratitude if sent, through Post Office in this village, to Your ardent Friend,

I thank you Sir for the copy of the 2d edn of your Moral Instructor. I had read the 1st edn. with great satisfaction and encouraged it's reading in my family. I do not think the 2d edn. has gained by the omission of the extracts from Volney's l. of nature. it's publication will be useful, but age & a stiffd wrist rendering writing very irksome and painful to me, I cannot embark in the promotion of that public because it would subject me to considerable writing which is now the oppression of my life. leaving it to younger hands therefore with my best wishes for it's success . . .

I have read the oration with great satisfaction; and it is a comfort to me when I find the sound principles of the revolution cherished and avowed by the rising generation. While those prevail that are expressed by Mr Willard, we have nothing to fear for our happy institutions. I am particularly sensible of the partial sentiments which Mr Loring has been so kind as to express towards myself. I cannot flatter myself however that they harmonised with all those of a mixed audience, it was my fortune or fate to be placed at the head of the column which first entered the breach in the walls of federalism, and I have perhaps no right to expect an entire oblivion of past feelings. I hope they will lessen with time, and in the meanwhile I am particularly thankful for the approbation of those who view my conduct more favorably.

This volume has been rebound in Forrest's typical quarter-leather binding. There is no shelf-mark of Jefferson.


