# Mrs. Azubah Freeman Ryder,

## A CENTENARIAN.

"Mrs. Azubah Freeman Ryder, was born in Eastham, Mass., Jan. 5, 1784. She arrived at Orrington, Me., in a sailing vessel with her parents Mr. Timothy Freeman and Mrs. Zeruah Nickerson Freeman, probably in Nov. 1788. She rode behind her mother on horseback from the landing place to her father's farm, then a wilderness, and is now owned by Mr. Ed. Witham and is about one mile from South Orrington post office on Bangor road."

"They brought with them seven daughters and three sons. The youngest daughter being the subject of this sketch."

Mr. Freeman was early appointed a Selectman in Orrington and the first Representative to the General Court of Mass. from Orrington, riding all the way to Boston on horseback.

Maine was then a province of Mass., it was admitted into the Union, March 15, 1820. He died Sept. 11, 1828. Her mother died Dec. 17, 1788, about one month after their arrival at Orrington, when Azubah was only four years old.

"When Washington died, a memorial sermon was delivered in Orrington. A grave had been dug, and Miss Azubah was one of the sixteen young ladies, each one 16 years of age, representing the sixteen States of the Union, who walked around the open grave, scattered flowers and sang a hymn, composed by a citizen of Orrington for the occasion."

When a little girl her father used to set her and her older sister Eunice, to watch the cornfield and drive away the bears which were plenty. One day as they watched, there came two bears after corn; they frightened them off and then up arose Capt. Samuel Bartlett, who was concealed close by, and said he too was watching and just ready to shoot at them. His cornfield adjoined theirs.

When James Freeman Esq. was a few days old little Azubah, then ten years of age, came through the woods to see him. He was her sister Mary's first child. She was so pleased with him that she stayed late, but thought she must go home anyway. When about half way through the woods she saw a large black bear by the road-

sids. She was terribly frightened but determined to get by; after awhile she got courage to slap her hands to frighten the bear and then ran for dear life, and arrived home safely.

Mr. Freeman is living at 94 years of age.

She tells of her conversion when young, in this way: She went to Jordan Brook near Newburg to visit a married sister and brother; when she arrived at her sister's they were about starting to spend the evening with some neighbors. She said she could stay alone as well as not and would not be afraid, but after they had gone she grew frightened. She thought of what she had read in the Bible and catechism, and thought if there was a father in Heaven to care for the lonely, why not ask Him to take care of her. She got down on her knees and prayed with all her might and seemed to hear Him say, "You are safe, I will take care of you." Thus she was very, very happy. She seemed to feel that He was with her in very truth and never feared after that. The next week she visited her brother. She and his two children and some neighbors' children were left one evening to keep house and, as they lived far apart in those days, with woods all about them and were in some fear of Indians as well as bears, of course some of them were afraid. She told them how she had spent that evening at her sister's alone and they thought it would be a good plan for

them all to pray. They did, and had a glorious time. Two of them were converted right then and there. It caused great rejoicing among the parents.

"Miss Azubah was a successful school teacher before and after her marriage. The building in which she taught school was called the Pine Top school house and stood in a pine forest on land now owned by Mr. Wallace T. Little, and formerly owned by Dr. John B. Pollard."

"She was married to Mr. Samuel Ryder of Provincetown, Mass. in 1806. Her wedding outfit of linen, cotton and woolen garments, bed clothes, table linen, towels and her wedding dress of white linen, were all manufactured by herself from raw materials. She manufactured the first suit of new clothes that her husband had after their marriage. It was brown, dyed in the wool and fulled at the mill. He was very proud of it."

Mrs. Ryder united with the M. E. Church about 1811. The old church which she attended was used for a town house after the new church was built, but was torn down about fifteen years ago. It stood on the farm now owned by Mr. Warren Nickerson. The foundation is still to be seen on the west side of the town road. When the M. E. Church at South Orrington was organized, Mr. and Mrs. Ryder were among its first members. In 1814 Mr. and Mrs.

Ryder lived at her father's and when the U. S. ship of war Adams, carrying 24 guns was deserted and burned by her crew at Hampden, Mr. Ryder, who belonged to the militia, was sent to row four of her officers in a five handed open boat to Boston." While dredging the Penobscot river several years ago, the men brought up what was supposed to be one of the "Adam's" guns which afterwards, at the celebration of the opening of the E. & N. A. R. R. was carried to Vanceboro on a platform car and was used to fire the salute.

"On the afternoon of Sept. 3, 1814, Mrs. Ryder sat by the window and her three children were playing on the doorsteps. She noticed soldiers passing by in the distance and supposed they were the militia. Soon her husband's sister Lydia called and said they were British Soldiers and that the British Fleet was below sailing up the river. Mrs. Ryder started and walked with the children to Orrington Centre, to Captain Barzillai Rich's and that night her fourth child was born. The farm is now owned by Michael Rich, son of Barzillai. After quite a long absence her husband arrived home from his perilous undertaking which he had accomplished in safety and was welcomed back as one returned from the dead." They afterwards owned and lived on the farm in South Orrington, now owned by their youngest son, Capt. John A.

Ryder, aged 67 years. Mr. Samuel Ryder died in 1861.

When bringing up her family, her husband's sister, Mrs. Bethia Nickerson lived in the house with her; they used the large kitchen together, also the oven and fireplace, each kept her family on their side of the room; swept, washed, sanded the floor as they pleased, but never had any trouble as they both often said. They allowed the children to visit each other when convenient.

One morning she was up bright and early, did her washing, and put it out on the line, by nine o'clock. By and by she saw people going to church and then reckoned up and found that she had kept Saturday for Sunday. She was "most poisoned" as she said, but went to church as usual. She always kept Sunday very strictly, and would never do any work that day except what she was obliged to. Small sins looked large to her and she would always rebuke the seeming sinner, but never speak of it to others.

The names of their eight children are Capt. Samuel Ryder, Orrington. Mr. Thomas Ryder, Riverside. (East Providence,) R. I., Mrs. Jane T. Rooks, Mrs. Deborah Fowler, Miss Caroline Ryder, Mrs. Mary Ann Wood, Miss Azubah Ryder. Capt. John A. Ryder of South Orrington. Only three of their children are living;

Samuel, Thomas and John Atkins.

Mrs. Azubah Freeman Ryder has lived for a number of years with her eldest son Samuel, who is in his 80th year, but she is now living with her eldest grand-daughter, Mrs. Jacob Harding, Orrington Centre.

She enjoys good health, has a good appetite and sleeps well. She puts her clothing on and off without assistance, makes her own bed, and likes to wash dishes and sweep the room. She is straight as an arrow and very handsome, sweet-looking and neat. Never used any spirituous liquors or tobacco. She retires at 8 P. M. arises at 5 or 5.30 A.M. Her weight is 112 lbs. She was always a pattern housekeeper; had a time and place for everything; was a good cook and a good seamstress. Last and best of all she was a devoted wife and mother.

She has a pleasant disposition, is not given to anger, is never in a hurry, is industrious, frugal and given to charity.

She often sings these verses:—

“The world is full of confusion,

The people make it so;

Oh, what is their conclusion,

The Lord doth only know.

But I will stand my station,

As I have done before;

Pray for the whole creation;

And what can I do more?”

She always cultivated a flower and vegetable garden. One time she put a green willow branch in the ground for sweet peas to run up on. The willow took root and so she let it grow, and today more than thirty years after it is a tree over nineteen inches in diameter at the butt.

"Mrs. Ryder has lived under the administration of all the Presidents and has out-lived all but two of them."

She has nineteen living grandchildren, thirty-four great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren. She is a lineal descendant of Edmund Freeman, who came from Devonshire, England in 1635, in the ship Abigail, Richard Hackwell, master; and settled in Saugus and afterwards in Sandwich, Mass.

The following is the inscription on gravestone at South Orrington, of Capt. Samuel Ryder, who married Azubah Freeman.

**THE CENTENNIAL OF THE TOWN OF**  
Orrington was celebrated June 28, 1888, with considerable ceremony. A feature of the occasion was the presence of Mrs. Azubah Freeman Ryder, aged 104 years 6 months, who is believed to be the oldest woman in New England. The literary programme consisted of prayer by Rev. W. P. Sewell, reading of the act of incorporation by J. S. Rowe, introduction of Mrs. Ryder, by Mr. Geo. Brooks who said:—

"It is my pleasure and honor to present and introduce to you today Mrs. Azubah Freeman Ryder, a woman almost one hundred and five years old and the oldest inhabitant of the place if not of New England. It is a sight not one in this congregation nor probably one in a thousand such congregations will ever see again. It is a wonder to contemplate, a woman who has passed a life of virtue, extending over a hundred and five years, or five years longer than the time when this town was incorporated." Historical address by Col. Joseph W. Porter, address by Hon. Hannibal Hamlin, poem by Miss Rebecca R. Pierce, oration by Rev. Mark Trafton, D. D., of Boston, poem by Mrs. H. G. Rowe, entitled "The Foremothers of Orrington," war record and historical sketches of early families by various gentlemen. A fine dinner was served, guns were fired, base ball games were played and fire works were burned

The town sent 242 men to the civil war, one half the number liable to service and one eighth of the entire population. No liquor has been sold in the town for 58 years.

### A Hundred Years 1788-1888.

#### NOTES.

"In 1772 there were 22 men settled on township, these men formed a company and run out the township; 'beginning at Bucks Ledge, northerly of Buckstown and extending up the river about 13 miles to the Bend ' now Eddington."

"In 1770 Moses Wenthworth, came from Penobscot, (Castine,) and located at Mill Creek, (South Orrington.) He built the first Saw Mill

---

in Orrington, and was the first settler in the limits of the present town."

"Rev. Enoch Mudge, was the first settled minister; came to Orrington in 1797. He was the first Methodist minister raised in New England. He died April 2, 1850."

"Col. John Brewer, the founder of the town was a man of integrity and influence, was the first Postmaster, office was at Brewer Village. Died July 31, 1835, aged 83 years."

"Simeon Fowler, was a native of Westerly, R. I. He was the first treasurer of the county of Hancock, which then included Penobscot."

"Dr. Elisha Skinner, a Revolutionary soldier settled near Brewer Ferry in 1787. He was the first settled Physician on the \*Penobscot river above Fort Pownal, (Fort Point.) He was a Freemason and the first master of Rising Virtue Lodge, now in Bangor. He died Nov. 3, 1827, aged 73."

"Capt. Samuel Bartlett, was the first merchant in what is now Orrington in 1789. His store and wharf were at Bartlett's Cove and Point above Bald Hill. He was also a ship master and he and his ship were detained in France from 1793 to 1795."

Edmund Freeman was born, tradition says, in Devonshire, England, in 1590. He came from England in the year 1635 in the ship *Abigail*, Richard Hackwell, master, sailing from London with many passengers. It has been said, no doubt correctly, of those generally, "who left England for the New World in the West" from 1620 to 1660, that "they were staunch supporters of the rights of the people, and with them departed the very heart of England's manhood." He settled in Saugus but was subsequently in Plymouth Colony; was admitted freeman at Plymouth, Jan. 2, 1687, and after a short residence in Duxbury, he and others established Sandwich, the first English town on the Cape. He was early appointed the head of a court of three "to hear and determine controversies and causes," within the several contiguous townships.

He was always prominent, active, influential.

There can be found no blemish in his eventful life, no dark spot in his whole history.

His remains, with those of his wife, still rest in Sandwich, under the rustic monuments known as "*the Saddle and Pillion*." It is about a mile and a quarter west of the Town Hall in Sandwich.

The preceding Maj. John Freeman is frequently mentioned in the public records, first as "Lieut.," subsequently as "Capt.," and later as "Major," and who m. Mercy, a dr. of Gov. Prence and was a resident in Sandwich. A few years after, removed to Eastham, was among the earliest settlers with Gov. Prence. Did service in the Indian wars. Was a large land holder. He was prominent in public affairs in Eastham. He was Deputy, from 1654, eight years; Selectman, from 1663, ten years; Assistant in the Government, from 1666, several years; and later in life, Dec. 7, 1692; was appointed to the Bench of the Court of Common Pleas. Was Deacon of the Eastham Church, for many years. His wife Mercy d. Sept. 28, 1711, aged 80. He d. Oct. 28, 1719, aged 92. Both are buried in the graveyard at Eastham.

Deacon Thomas Freeman was one of the persons who were of the first church in Harwich, was elected Deacon, Nov. 28, 1700. Was many years Town Clerk, Treas. and Selectman. The above Mr. Thomas Freeman "d. of smallpox," Jan. 19, 1766, and was a resident of that part of Harwich now S. Orleans. "The disease of which he d. was contracted at Col. Ryder's in C., where he had been called to render medical aid, he being some what skilled in the art of healing." He was appointed "Justice for the Portanumquut Indians" 1765. His widow Dorathy was a member of Mr. Bascom's church in Orleans. She died 1782.

Mr. Timothy Freeman m. 1st., a dr. of Reuben Nickerson of Harwich, Oct. 21, 1767 and removed to Orrington, Me., 1788. He was a prominent man in Eastham and resided on the ancestral farm now in So. Orleans as late as 1785. His wife Zerulah, d.

Dec. 17, 1788 "at the birth of Thomas;" and he m. 2d. Mary Deane, wid. of Archelans. He was early appointed as one of the board of selectmen, in Orrington, and the first representative to the General Court of Mass. He obtained an act securing to the inhabitants of Orrington the exclusive right of taking fish on the shore of the Penobscot river within its corporate limits; from which the inhabitants of Orrington received an annual revenue of about \$800, from sales of the municipal right to take fish on the shores of the Penobscot, for many years.
