



Caught in the Deadly Hail of a Mitrailleuse

A truly sensational photograph, taken in October near St. Quentin, France, by a German officer, who deserted his command and escaped over the Dutch frontier. The photograph was made from a German trench, and shows a Boche bombing squad being driven back to their own trench by French machine gun fire. Five of the seven Germans have been hit and are down for the count; the other two are making all haste for the protection of the shell crater in the foreground. A grenade shows plainly in the right hand of the second Hun from the left.
