



Caught in Their Own Gas Attack

The biter bitten. The Boche, just before launching a surprise attack, often uses bombs to throw up a dense screen of smoke and mask his movements. Should the wind change direction, many of the men in the bomb squad are overcome before they can dash out of the danger zone. This is what has happened in the distinctly unusual picture shown. The German soldiers are flying before a deadly cloud of gas meant for the French. Two of the Huns have been caught by the gas waves, one inhalation of which is enough to drop them.
