



This inspiring monument is to be erected by the citizens of Princeton, N. J., on the green in front of the Princeton Inn. The group in high relief stands 26 feet, at the base of a shaft 50 feet in height. The sides of the shaft are decorated with trophies and implements of war and the coats of arms of the thirteen original states. Frederick MacMonnies is the sculptor of the group and Thomas Hastings, the architect of the shaft.
