"Old-time lackadaisical and haphazard ways will not do in this new era of doing big things in a big way. Education has sounded a new note."





Founded in 1911 by Leo Freedman, who is its President and chief officer, the Rhodes School


has had a phenomenal growth. Its present enrollment is put in round numbers at 1,500 students. The school conducts two sessions, a day session from 9 A. M. to 2:30 P. M. and an evening session from 7:15 to 10:15. Because of superior methods in teaching, pupils are enabled to save considerable time before entering upon professional study. They are prepared for entrance to all colleges and universities for the professions of medicine, dentistry, law, accountancy, teaching, podiatry, pharmacy, engineering, agriculture, forestry, and for general academic and cultural training.

Dr. Freedman, when recently interviewed, said that his advice to prospective students reduces itself to these three prime factors: 1.—"Keep in mind that in college it matters a great deal from which preparatory school one comes; 2.—be careful in the choice of that school and do not risk your


career in entrusting the moulding of your future where you see the possibility of incurring a lesser initial expense; 3.—avoid schools lacking the requisite facilities, engaging inefficient teachers and employing inferior methods—all of which tend toward lowering educational standards."

The new requirement imposed by colleges upon all students seeking admission—an individually prepared science laboratory notebook in biology, chemistry and physics—is adequately and satisfactorily met by the Rhodes School. Its science laboratory department is complete and elaborate and surpasses in size and equipment most science laboratories in the large public high schools and colleges of New York City.

The Fall Term, which opens on the 15th of September, promises to be a record breaker in the history of the school.
