


Charming Old Landmarks make Splendid Setting for Many New Homes



Garden City Estates is known for its wide avenues, lined by beautiful old trees among which stand the homes of many men well known in New York's business and social activities.





St. Paul's and St. Mary's. Throughout the educational world these names represent the highest standards. St. Paul's is a boys' school; St. Mary's is for girls.




The Cathedral and residence of the Bishop of Long Island are distinctive features of this suburban residential
