Letter from Mrs. Alexander Graham Bell to Dr. Alexander Graham Bell. 1331 Connecticut Avenue. Washington, D. C. (Mar. 6, 1909.) Dear Alec:

What does enclosed mean. Will it lead to all our difficulties being solved? I am quite excited.

No signs of the baby yet and I don't believe it will come before the middle of March. Still I am glad I came as I can see my family now as I can't when you are here, and I think with Casey and Douglas and your work you'll be happy.

Mr. Booth called today and gave me some letters which are encouraging. Harris Taylor is evidently very much interested. He thinks
