This year the Choral Club continued its custom of meeting weekly to promote and foster better singing and a fuller appreciation of music. Professor Benjamin Grosbayne addressed and conducted the club during the term. Miss Anne Weeks, one of the many guest speakers, spoke on *Voice Production*.

Under the guidance of Mr. Arthur Lichstein of the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra, and Miss Anne Weeks of the Music Department, the choir performed at chapel in November, in conjunction with the orchestra. Bach's *Sleepers Awake*, Mozart's *Gloria*, and Schubert's *Omnipotence* were among the selections sung. With the orchestra, the club presented the opera *Prince Igor*. Singing at college chapels was a part of the program of the club. Among the club's other activities were radio programs and outside concerts.

The requirements for membership in the Choir are a fair voice, a musical ear, and a slight knowledge of music. College credit is given to the members who attend rehearsals regularly—one half credit for each semester.

Among its columns in the past year was *Collegewires*, consisting of spicy comments of other colleges; "!", containing our own Brooklyn College wit; and a Drama Review column. 
