



**SUGGESTIONS FOR MR. KAYE'S PARTICIPATION IN THE 1960 WHITE
HOUSE CONFERENCE ON CHILDREN & YOUTH**

March 27 - April 2

- (1) Moderate a panel of American youth at the Youth Evaluation Session, Thursday evening, March 31st, in the Ballroom of the Sheraton Park Hotel. Approximately 1,000 teenagers (age up to 21) will be attending this session. The panel discussion would be concerned with conditions that effect the growth and development of young America.
- (2) Preside at the meeting of youth as well as moderate the panel.
- (3) Produce an American counterpart of the UNICEF film but with the White House Conference as the beginning and end of the film. This subject in greater detail is outlined on the next page.
- (4) Moderate a panel of youth and adults, all foreign nationals, at the foreign participant evaluation session Friday afternoon, April 1st. The 600 foreign nationals participating at the Conference will attend this session to compare notes on what they got out of the Conference.
- (5) Attend sessions of the Conference as a member of the President's National Committee, participating as a delegate in Theme Assemblies, Forums, and Workgroups. These will meet morning and afternoon, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, March 28 - 30, and on Thursday afternoon, March 31st.
- (6) Attend and participate in a meeting of the President's National Committee immediately after the Conference on Saturday, April 2nd.

Following the format of the UNICEF film, Mr. Kaye would project the conditions and problems affecting American youth as related to the issues and findings of the White House Conference. Such a film should be available for showing after the White House Conference although a part of it could be made during the Conference. The film would be made available to national television networks and for wide spread local channel use. It would also be shown at the opening of each of the 55 Little White House Conferences scheduled by the states and territories during 1960. Following are suggestions for the format of such a film:

- a. Danny Kaye talking to teen-agers at the White House Conference. The discussion brings out the history of the White House Conference and illustrates some of the national problems on which previous Conferences have focused--orphanages, child labor, health problems, etc.
- b. Mr. Kaye joining a juvenile judge on a bench and hearing a delinquency case.
- c. Mr. Kaye visiting with physically handicapped children.
- d. Mr. Kaye meeting a public school integrated classroom.
- e. Mr. Kaye being received in a family setting--a family with several children who are "growing up."
- f. Mr. Kaye with children and youth in a playground setting--a good one and an inadequate one.
- g. Mr. Kaye meeting with a variety of local and state youth councils.
- h. Mr. Kaye reporting the findings of the 1960 White House Conference and setting forth the major problems that must be solved in the next ten years.
