

Honor for Mahanoy City Priest

The Rev. P. McEnroe, rector of St. Canicus Church, Mahanoy City, and fifty years a priest, was further honored yesterday when Bishop McCort presided at the jubilee mass with the Rev. I. M. McCabe, D. D., of St. Charles Seminary, and Rev. H. McGettigan, chaplain, and Monsignore McGovern, of Pottsville, celebrant.

In the afternoon a parade of Catholic societies was held. The celebration closed at the armory last night, where 300 banqueted with the veteran priest as guests of honor. Lieutenant Governor McClain was among the speakers. A purse of \$1500 in gold was presented to Father McEnroe.

Find Substitutes for Flour.

Since wheat and rye flour became so scarce in Europe, substitutes have been sought even for such purposes as thickening the electrolyte of dry batteries. Waterglass, kieselguhr, gelatin, sawdust, starch and glass wool are among the more or less satisfactory substitutes, and a base or binder for the electrolyte is obtained by using one of these substances or a mixture of two or more. This binder is made to absorb the electrolyte, which may be a concentrated solution made by stirring into distilled water, at about 100 degrees Fahrenheit, a mixture of 80 parts of sal ammoniac, 80 of calcium acetate, as of zinc chloride and 10 of glycerin. This paste, applied between the battery plates and covered with paraffin with gas vents, is claimed to retain its pasty condition, without crystallizing or absorbing moisture.
